


## FROM THE RECTOR'S DESK



## Wednesdays at PSJS XXIII!

It all began when I moved in on Wednesday, August 24 just two days before the Mass of the Holy Spirit, when I signed my Oath of Fidelity as Rector to Cardinal Seán, and the fall semester began. What followed in rapid succession was a series of Wednesday events beginning with a farewell luncheon on Wednesday, September 14



for Fr. Palardy, my predecessor and 8th Rector of the Seminary. We then hosted back to back "under the tent" events: our 35th Annual Lawn Party with over 350 friends and supporters attending on Wednesday, September 28, and then a Lobster Bake for some 200 visiting Vocation Directors the following Wednesday, October 5. The next Wednesday, October 12, I celebrated Mass in Biddeford, Maine with our seminarians at their Annual Retreat. The focus then switched to our returning alumni for Alumni Days, Wednesday, October 19, and a keynote presentation from John Allen on: "The Global War on Christians". That same day Catholic TV was here filming a promotional piece on our new Learning Center. The Wednesdays in October conclude with our Board Meeting on (you guessed it!) Wednesday the 26th.

The Wednesdays begin all over again in November with, for the moment, an Alumni Dinner in Springfield, the USCCB Conference in Baltimore and a Knights of Malta dinner here at the Seminary.



## A Pastor Appointed Rector of Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary

*First, Fr. Kiely, I must tell you, since your first day here, your practice of greeting the men every morning after Mass or Morning Prayer has been very warmly received.*

Thank you, it's something I learned and have continued from my first parish assignment. I have felt it's a small

gesture that easily connects the priest with his people. I'm also hopeful that by this example our men will adopt this practice in their ministries.

*Now tell us a little about yourself.*

Well, I'm a priest of the Archdiocese of Boston, ordained in 1978, who comes with 38 years of pastoral assignments locally and in the Virgin Islands. The past two years I served as the Episcopal Vicar of the West Region of the Archdiocese until the Cardinal asked that I succeed Fr. Palardy as the Rector of Pope St. John XXIII. I laughed and said, "You're kidding right." Of course, he wasn't. I told him with all due respect "I'm not an academic and I have no background in priestly formation", but the Cardinal insisted. I spent the night in prayer and could not find a real reason to say no. I told the Cardinal I would do it, "and I have not regretted it one bit. So you guys are stuck with me!"

My earlier pastoral assignments were varied and included some very valuable experiences: managing a parish school with the sometimes competing interests of parents and parishioners; closing a church which had been run by an Order that suddenly withdrew; building a new church from a one-room school house and, finally, living as a "minority" for three years in the predominantly black culture of the Virgin Islands. I mention these as examples of the diverse challenges that await our men in their ministries. And, in some small way, I'm hopeful that my experiences might help prepare them.

*What has been your experience your first two months?*

It has been extremely positive—and busy. I am most impressed with the people—the faculty, the seminarians and

the staff. Everyone has been so welcoming and helpful.

*What do you see as the most pressing issue at PSJS?*

I feel there are two and they are related: finances and enrollment. First, I want the seminary on a sound financial footing. The seminary can certainly pay its bills, but there are a lot more things the seminary could do if it had the resources, such as a native-Spanish speaking priest on faculty and/or expanding the Spanish language program—perhaps even adding a Portuguese program. I want the men leaving here well prepared to meet the needs of their ministry.

Secondly, increasing vocations, and enrollment, is our top priority. We need to let men know that it is possible to become a priest later in life as Msgr. Conley said in his Opening Prayer for the 200 Vocation Directors at the recent lobster bake. He stated that the Apostles, that Christ called, were middle-aged, more mature men and all had careers. Older men can certainly go to other seminaries and that may be great for that seminary, but the question is whether that seminary is great for that man? Here at PSJS the men are formed in an age appropriate way and with their peers.

*Where do you see PSJS in the years ahead?*

I see opportunities that can be expanded. I want not only the faculty to "dream a bit" about what is possible, but also the students. You men come from diverse backgrounds with a lot of talents. One of the challenges is to make sure we utilize those gifts to make this a communal effort. I need the assistance of everyone. So it's not just what do I see it being, but what do we see it being. I don't have that vision right now; I think we are in the process of prayerfully discerning what that vision might be. We will to do it together.

*Final thoughts?*

I would be remiss if I didn't express my deepest appreciation to Fr. Bill Palardy, my predecessor, for all that he has done for PSJS first, as Academic Dean then as Rector. I am honored to follow him at this most blessed institution and on behalf of all the faculty, the seminarians and staff—"we wish him the very best as the Pastor of St. Agatha Parish in Milton."

new Auxiliary Bishop of Boston. The Lawn Party is the Seminary's signature fundraiser and was again this year chaired by Julie and John Corcoran and family.




The Lawn Party was a "first" for Very Rev. Brian R. Kiely who was appointed the 9th Rector just weeks earlier. Father Kiely had spent the majority of his priesthood in pastoral assignments and most recently was the Regional Vicar for the West Region of the Archdiocese. Father Kiely thanked the prior Seminary Rectors and the "many faithful whose financial support have allowed this seminary to flourish."

The featured speaker this year was John Allen, Jr., editor of Crux Now, a news outlet carrying news, features, and community content about the Catholic Church and Catholicism. On Tuesday evening, Mr. Allen delivered the keynote presentation, entitled "The Global War on Christians: Why Anti-Christian Persecution is the Transcendent Human Rights Issue of the Early 21st Century". A sobering topic, to say the least, but all in attendance were deeply touched by Mr. Allen's presentation. Of note: over the last 3 years, there has been a 139% increase in attacks on Christians - depending on the human rights organization data, "...there is either every five minutes or every hour of everyday a

Of note: the Pope has an overall approval rating of 81% (CNN poll). Aside from the dynamic of increased social media, Mr. Allen offered three pillars that make this Pope so special: a passion for those on the periphery as evidenced by his travel to places in need of Vatican attention; a seriousness about service – to priests, "carry the smell of the sheep"; and lastly, his mania for Mercy.



## Around The Seminary





I had an initial vocation call to the Priesthood when I was a child, but let it go and chased it away. There are only so many times that you can ignore the call before you must answer it. That led me to the seminary, and thus my experiences at St Mary's led me to become a part of the community here at PSJS. I am truly blessed to be a part of this community, which has been so welcoming.”*

**EDWIN A. NALAGAN -ARCHDIOCESE OF OKLAHOMA CITY, OK**



My career prior to seminary was as a Hospital Administrator. I served in several financial and administrative roles for INTEGERS Health in Oklahoma City culminating in my final position as Chief Financial Officer for INTEGERS Baptist Medical Center and INTEGERS Southwest Medical Center in Oklahoma City in 2010 when I "retired" from my career to enter seminary and answer God's call.

*“I have always known that God was calling me to his service in some kind of capacity even as a young child. I just wasn't one of those brave and enlightened young men that answered God's call at a young age. I often say, I let Jesus roll into voicemail for the better part of 26 years. Finally in 2011 I listened to my heart and left all of my fears behind and applied to become a seminarian for the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City - a decision I still value more than anything else I have done in life thus far. People often ask me if miss my former life and all of it's trappings (financial, prestige, independence, etc.) I always answer with a resounding no, because I did not wake up one day and say to myself ‘Gee, I want to be a Hospital Administrator’ I did however wake up one morning and told God ‘I would like to be a priest, if you will have me.’”*



**BR. STEPHEN SHANAHAN, OCSO - ST. JOSEPH'S ABBEY, SPENCER, MA**

I have a culinary degree, and spent years catering everything from homes, halls, offices - to even Tall Ships! My prior career has also entailed selling furniture and working in a casino.

*"This has been a call that I have ignored for years, I've taken many calls trying to run from God, and what he wanted from me. But when I finally turned around and listened, and said to myself I wanted to be a monk and a priest, I thought it was too late for me I'm too old and I've been on my own for far too long. I think that made God laugh, and say Stephen you're always thinking you are alone and relying on yourself. I am now a Trappist Monk and a seminarian. I'm from St Joseph's Abbey so there is a history of monks coming here, and they have always said how impressed they were with the seminary, the community life, the quality of the teachers and support was second to none - and that is exactly what I have found at PSJS."*

**PETER OKAJIMA - DIOCESE OF BROOKLYN, NY**



My previous work experience was in finance, specifically banking. **MAZEN MIKE ELIAS - DIOCESE OF ST. AUGUSTINE, FL**



I was born in Ramallah, Palestine on the West Bank of Jordan and raised with my five siblings in Jacksonville, FL. I thank God for my parents who instilled in me their authentic Christian values and their charitable efforts toward their neighbors.

*"Beginning at age 12, I learned the meaning of work in my father's grocery store. And in my adult life, ethics and moral principles continued to form me while working in the family business. These values were especially dear to me during my 20 years of corporate life in the chemical and financial services industries. In the last several years, as my mother's full time caregiver, I gained several new dimensions in my life; one being the fruit of the spiritual life. The call to the priesthood came in January 2014. After several months of both reflecting on my past and in examining my life experiences, I can see now how His hand had directed my past as well as how He prepared me for this new task. With a contrite heart, around Easter of 2015, I applied to the Vocation Office of the Diocese of St. Augustine, and a year later I was accepted by the Vocation Board as a seminarian. May God's grace continue to sustain all seminarians to walk in His holy footsteps."*



**PAT LOPRESTI - ARCHDIOCESE OF ADELAIDE, AUSTRALIA**

Having a Master of Laws Degree I worked for the State Attorney General as a lawyer representing the state in both criminal and personal injury as well as negligence matters. After several years I left the full-time practice of the law and worked in retail property development and part-time legal research.

*"Since the age of five I thought about priesthood but never seriously explored my calling. That all changed in June 2012 with my return from volunteering in Lourdes. I made the call to my Vocation Director that would change the direction of my life. Two years of spiritual direction and discernment ultimately led me to Pope Saint John XXIII National Seminary."*

**DEACON MAURICE M. CULVER - DIOCESE OF ST. AUGUSTINE, FL**



I entered Pope St. John XXIII National Seminary "twice retired": first as a physician, Medical Officer, United States Navy, and second, as a Professor from Florida State College at Jacksonville.

*"As I review my spiritual journey I've sought to answer a yearning that, as the author, David Brooks, of The Road to Character, terms "the Adam I", attempts to succeed in the secular world. However, one finds that everything in the secular realm is just not enough; there is more. It is the journey to that fulfillment, that Brooks terms our "Adam II" or our "eulogy virtues" that has brought me to Pope St. John XXIII Seminary. There is a realization that I can do more for God's people; I've already answered the call to the Permanent Diaconate and the yearning to do more for His people does not cease. My Bishop and I believe that the further formation that I require is here at this seminary."*
